Self- Righteous Service versus True Service. By Pastor Paul

Jesus while on earth said much about serving others. He said even of himself that "the son of man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Throughout Gods Word we are called to put the needs of others ahead of our own- to give of our time and talent and treasures for the sake of others. This is the mark of a true Christian. Richard J. Foster wrote a book that has become a classic and must read for all those who desire to serve the Lord better- it is titled, "*Celebration of Discipline*". Within the chapter dealing with the issue of service, he offers two lists concerning servanthood. The section is titled, self-righteous service versus true service. Let us read it and reflect on our mind while serving others.

Self-righteous service comes through human effort- True service comes from a relationship with the divine **Other** deep inside. We serve out of whispered promptings, divine urgings. Self-righteous service is impressed with the "big deal" it is only interested in serving when impressive gains can be made, and when the service is titanic.

Self-righteous service requires external rewards. It needs to know that people see and appreciate the effort- it seeks human applause. True service rests contented in hiddenness. It does not fear the lights and blare of attention, but it does not seek them either.

Self-righteous service is highly concerned about results. It eagerly waits to see if the person served will reciprocate in kind. And become bitter when the results fall below expectations. True service is free of the need to calculate results. It delights only in the service. It can serve enemies as freely as friends.

Let us all analyze ourselves and ask the LORD to reveal attitudes that do not line up with what true service is. If we ask the LORD, He will be faithful to show us.
